Use of Equipment - Track Maintenance Plant & Machinery	Organisers may suffer serious, possibly fatal, injury from accidents involving track maintenance machinery i.e. tractors, trailers, water bowsers, PTO drives; earth moving equipment, tele handlers, rollers, powered harrows etc.	Due to the specialist nature of track maintenance work only competent and experienced operators will use track maintenance plant & machinery

Temporary Structures	Persons at the event may suffer serious injury if struck by flying parts from a temporary structure that has blown away.	<ul> <li>Temporary structures such as tents, marquees, awnings and gazebos etc. will be built by competent persons and secured to prevent their being blown away in high winds</li> </ul>				
Vehicle Movement - General Public & Track Maintenance Vehicles	Organisers (notably gate and car parking staff) and members of the public may suffer serious, possibly fatal, injury if struck by a vehicle.	■ Traffic management systems are used to minimise pedestrian and vehicle contact ■ Vehicles will travel at low speeds within the venue ■ Spectators are usually parked in separate car parks away from mass pedestrian areas ■ Competitors are usually parked in a designated paddock area ■ There is a strict policy of no riding machines in the pits ■ High-visibility tabards are worn by gate staff and other officials ■ Event & track maintenance vehicles will use designated routes for access purposes and vehicles are driven slowly with hazard warning lights on

Use of Medical Response Vehicles (Off-Road)	Medical personnel may suffer serious injuries from accidents involving medical response vehicles, quad bikes etc. when driven over potentially hazardous off road terrain.	Medical personnel are trained and experienced in driving emergency vehicles off-road  Drivers of medical response quad bikes will wear protective clothing including a crash helmet	Clerk of the Course to ensure Medical staff using quad bikes are suitably experienced and wearing correct protective equipment

## **Guidance Notes:**

Please be aware that as part of managing the health and safety of your event you must control the risks. To do this you need to think about what might cause harm to people and decide whether you are taking reasonable steps to prevent that harm. The hazards listed within this assessment are not meant to be exhaustive and you should add any further items as you consider necessary.

A risk assessment is not about creating huge amounts of paperwork, but rather about identifying sensible measures to control the risks at your event. You are probably already taking necessary steps, but your risk assessment will help you decide whether you have covered all you need to.

A risk assessment should be carried out by a competent person such as the Clerk of the Course for each event that you are organising. The arrangements within this risk assessment should be carried out in conjunction with any specific recommendations made within the Track Inspectors Risk Assessment. In all cases ACU MX events are to be organised in accordance with the current ACU Handbook and Requirements for Track Safety at Speed Events booklet.
